Time gaps in the women's race were similar to those separating the men. World Champion Chausson was just under four seconds clear of 1995 world champion, Leigh Donovan (USA, Mongoose). Chausson reported feeling very confident before the final she had comfortably won the semi-final - and the slippery ground conditions suited her riding style, which like Vouilloz utilises technical brilliance more than raw power.

Third place was taken by Elke Brutsaert (USA, Toyota-Schwinn), last year's winner. Marla Streb (USA, Yeti), who broke her ankle here last year in the semi-final before riding to third place in the final, took fifth.
