## **Peat Leads The Record Breakers**

After a storm moved through the area the night before the race, there were concerns that the course would be slow and slippery. While it was a little slower in morning qualifying runs, the sun dried out everything except a few wooded sections, leaving the run blazing fast. "Compared to Squaw, this course is way faster and tougher." said Steve Peat (GBR), who punctured in the final at Squaw Valley in round five after being second fastest in the semifinal. "I've always wanted to win on this course, because it's so tough," rejoiced Peat, 25. Second place finisher, Nicolas Vouilloz (FRA) echoed Peat's comments, and actually went further: "the course is too fast, you have to take many chances," he explained.



#### Men

17 years-old **Greg Minnaar** (*RSA*) set the early fast time for the men - 4'57.51". In his first year on the circuit, and with an 8th place result in Big Bear a few weeks ago at round four, Minnaar could be a rider to watch in the future. However, today his time stood up for barely half the field, before **Corrado Herin** (*ITA*) took over the 'hot seat', knocking three and a half seconds off Minnaar's time. Herin, who won at Mont-Sainte-Anne on his way to victory in the World Cup in 1997, held the lead only briefly, as a succession of riders shaved fractions off his time.

Australia's Sean McCarroll blew down through the finish structure, knocking the lead time down to 4'50.98". McCarroll's time would last through 20 riders, until Bas De Bever (NED), the eighth remaining rider, skinned a bare 0.014" off it. He barely got a chance to get used to the lead before yesterday's Dual winner, Eric Carter (USA) lopped a massive 2" off the leading time. In turn, Carter lasted two riders before Mickael Pascal (FRA) amazed the crowd, beating Carter by a 5" margin. Then it was Peat's turn. The intermediate split showed the Peat was on a stellar run - nearly five and a half seconds ahead of Pascal. He would lose a little bit on Pascal over the second half of the course, but still finished with a time of 4'38.97", at an average speed of 34.8 kph, a new course record, almost 10" faster than Vouilloz's world championship winning time of last year.



Peat couldn't celebrate just yet, though. Not until Nicolas Vouilloz, the World Cup leader, and winningest rider on the circuit had completed his run, could the British champion throw his hands in the air and do a victory jig. Vouilloz was gracious in defeat, saying that he had no problems on his run, and "Steve was just the fastest. I made a little mistake, at the bottom, but I know already that I was not having a winning run."

Peat attributed his win to "keeping my hands off the brakes. I knew that you would have to hang it out to win here, and that's what I tried to do." The win furthers his stated ambition of taking the World Cup overall title this season. "This is my best opportunity. I have always been consistent, and with all the races counting now, (the new system) rewards my consistency."

Second place for Vouilloz kept him in the lead of the World Cup series by 50 points, the margin between first and second place. This should make next week's race in Bromont, Quebec, the penultimate round of the series, particularly exciting. If the series comes down to a final round showdown at Kaprun, Austria, it will not be the first time for Vouilloz - he took the series from **Mike King** (USA) in the 1995 Kaprun final.

#### Women

1995 world champion **Leigh Donovan** (USA), and winner at Mont-Sainte-Anne in '96, was the sixth woman down the course, after having suffered a flat in the morning's semi-final. She used that experience to stoke herself up and posted a 5'26.52" - 4" faster than Anne-Caroline Chausson's (FRA) winning time of the morning, and equal to the time the young Frenchwoman posted to win the 1998 world championship here. This time bettered rider after rider, with no one able to come within 7", **Missy Giove** (USA), the rider who "either crashes out or finishes first or second" at Mont-Sainte-Anne overcame a lingering shoulder injury from Mammoth to knock 6" off Donovan's time. It was now up to Chausson.

Only 0.41" faster than Giove at the intermediate time check, the World Cup leader was brilliant in the second half, winning by over 3", with a new record time of 5'17.22". Chausson admitted to some nervousness, after she heard how fast Giove was. "I knew that I would have to go very fast, take more chances. I didn't know if I had enough (to do it)." The French champion also pointed out that she has only done well on this course "when it is wet. This is my first ever win here when it is dry." The win extends Chausson's lead over Giove to 330 points, making her position virtually unassailable as the series heads into the final two events.
