Women - More Chausson Magic

Anne-Caroline Chausson, 22, from Dijon in *France*, produced a high altitude performance in the head and dust today that shows she is now able to consistently produce her best performances in races other than the World

Championships and those outside Europe.

In the past, Chausson has exhibited a tendency to crack under the extended pressure of World Cup racing. But by posting a time of 4'58.03" and winning with a margin of more than 13 seconds, the young French star seems to have taken a big psychological step forward. Chausson finished ahead of *GT* team-mates **Mercedes Gonzalez** (ESP) and **Katja Repo** (FIN).

"It is important for my sponsor for me to win in the USA," Chausson told journalists at the finish. She was so tired at the end that she had to be helped off her bike. Then she sat down at that point and from there told the story of her race.

"I was really fast at the start, and then I heard about Missy Giove's crash, and that I was 7" faster (this is the first race in which Chausson has received in-race information), so I felt really confident. But then 2" later I crashed! Then I got tired and I lost my confidence." After a further crash, Chausson arrived at the finish to discover her massive winning margin - which just goes to show how tough it must have been for the others.

About 15" earlier, Gonzalez, who was celebrating her 36th birthday anniversary and plans to retire and the end of the season, had taken the lead with a time of 5'11.19". "I felt fatigued like I used to in motocross," said Gonzalez, a former professional motorcycle racer. Her run was far from normal, as she explained: "At the first big drop-off, all the photographers sang Happy Birthday, and that set the mood. From then on I just went for it... Not bad for a veteran, eh?"

Gonzalez finished only 0.17" faster than Repo, who she knows from the moto-cross circuit.


Chausson's main series rival, and winner at Big Bear last week, **Missy Giove** (USA) had a frustrating run. After finishing second in the semi-final, with a time of 5'00.56", 14.62" slower than Chausson, she then had two big crashes in the final and finished sixth with a time of 5'18.21". Chausson's lead in the World Cup now stands at a somewhat unassailable 380 points. She has now won four of the five races in the series so far, and a total of 16 in her career. She has entered six world championships and won all of them.

Men - Vouilloz Defeats the Newcomer

Christopher Kovarik, 21, from Brisbane, *Australia*, riding in only his second World Cup downhill race, improved his time from 4'28" in the semi-final to 4'04" in the final. This time was almost good enough to win the race. **Nicolas Vouilloz** (*FRA*), the last rider down the mountain beat him by a mere 1.43".

Vouilloz was impressed, to say the least. "When I heard I had to beat 4'04", I thought at first that maybe there had been a mistake with the timing, but they never make mistakes, so I knew it would be hard." He had not expected to improve significantly on his semi-final time of 4'08.52". This result brings Vouilloz's total of world cup round wins to 10.

As for Kovarik, some say his result was a fluke while others are convinced that here is a potential new star. In his own words, "I've got a way to go," summed up the taciturn Aussie. Although delighted by his result, he seemed unfazed by it all. Sitting coolly in the Hot Seat - which is occupied by the current fastest rider - he quietly answered questions from journalists. "I was just hoping to

beat my semi-final position of 17th. I had no idea that I could go this fast... I rode consistently, I was conservative in places," explained the rider who has competed in mountain bike events on the Australian circuit for the past three years. Kovarik expresses a preference for rough, technical courses, which will be interesting with Mont-Sainte-Anne and Bromont approaching.

World Cup leader, **Steve Peat** (*GBR*), was slowed in his run by a puncture, which he sustained in the first 600m of racing. Finishing with a time of 4'12.43," Peat was still good enough for sixth place. This puts him back into second place overall, 100 points behind Vouilloz.

David Vazquez (ESP) claimed third place with a time of 4'08.89".

The World Cup circuit now adjourns for three weeks, resuming at Mont-Sainte-Anne, Canada on 31 July.
