## **World Cup Downhill's Exciting Finish**

Downhilling's 2001 season in the **Tissot-UCI World Cup** came to a close on a brilliant sunny afternoon in *Quebec*, when 20-year-old **Greg Minnaar** (*RSA*, *Global Racing Team*) upset five-time champion **Nicolas Vouilloz** (*FRA*, *Vouilloz Racing Team*) for the men's world cup title. **Anne-Caroline Chausson** (*FRA*, *Volvo-Cannondale*) won the women's title decisively over #2 **Missy Giove** (*USA*, *Global Racing Team*), while two others - **Chris Kovarik** (*AUS*, *Intense Cycles*) and **Sabrina Jonnier** (*FRA*, *RSP Import Intense*) - made their debut as world cup winners.

Conditions on Mont Sainte-Anne's modified 3km course were perfect Saturday, as sunny blue skies brought out huge crowds and international media for the season's final round of racing just north of Quebec City. After the morning's qualifying round of racing, the world's top pros were ready for one last race to the finish, one last chance at overall world cup points.

The men's race was destined to be an exciting battle to the end, as young **Greg Minnaar** (RSA, Global Racing Team) came into this final round just 28 points behind five-time champion **Nicolas Vouilloz** (FRA, Vouilloz Racing Team). While Minnaar had shown impressive consistency throughout the season's qualifying and final sessions, Vouilloz had struggled in several races - which allowed the South African to close the gap following his breakout win in round seven.

Minnaar set the tone of the day by qualifying fastest, further reducing his deficit to just 8 points as Vouilloz seeded third-fastest. Sixthranked overall coming into the race, **Chris Kovarik** (AUS, Intense Cycles) qualified second-fastest and also served notice that the final round would be a thriller.

Fifth-seeded **Cedric Gracia** (FRA, Volvo-Cannondale) overtook the hotseat from **Nathan Rankin** (NZL, NZMBA) in the finals with a time of 5:04.7, but was quickly replaced by **Mickael Pascal** (FRA, Be-One Team) - who crossed the finish with a time of 5:04.13 - just 0.6 faster than Gracia who would finish fifth for the day, while Pascal would finish fourth.

The top-three finishers - as well as the world cup overall champion - were soon decided in a nail-biter that took less than ten minutes to complete. First, #3 seeded Vouilloz beat Gracia's time with a run of 5:02, taking the hotseat as he awaiting #2-seeded Kovarik. Chris, who was motivated to have a good run and make the top-five overall, soon blasted across the finish-line with a time of 4:59, taking the hotseat from Vouilloz.

Everyone then awaited the arrival of top-seeded Minnaar, who would have to finish faster than Vouilloz to earn the points necessary to win the overall title, and Vouilloz was sitting in second-place at the time. The crowd's attention soon went up the hill as Minnaar rode the final metres of the course, crossing the finish-line with a time of 5:01 - just one second faster than Vouilloz but

enough to upset the champion and take the title to South Africa, while Kovarik earned his career's first win.

"It feels awesome," said the reserved Kovarik after his victory. "I had trouble with my visa this season, then with my knee, so I needed a good result to make the top-five. I thought I could have a decent run and finish top-five today, but I figured it couldn't get worse than it was, so I went for it. Mid-run I felt good and thought I could win it - and put a jumble in the points."

And that's what he did, playing a part in Minnaar's championship upset, making for two very happy young riders on this day.

"It felt great," said Minnaar after receiving hugs and congratulation from his team and parents. "I'm the first non-European to win the downhill title. I thought I had a chance to win it today, and knew I had to beat Nico. So I was very happy to have a clean run."

Minnaar went on to say "I always tried to be consistent this season, and I think that had a lot to do with my success. Nico is such a good rider, so I'm even more stoked to beat him. I had some crazy lines in my qualifier, which also helped - along with the boost I got from winning the last round in Kaprun."

As for Vouilloz, he was philosophical about the loss of the title. "It was not the year for the favorites" he quipped, in reference to previous series-leaders **Steve Peat** (GBR, Team GT) and **Fabien Barel** (FRA, Team GT), who were both injured mid-season. "I was more disappointed this morning with my qualifier, but not so disappointed with my final run. I made a good race, was confident and rode at my capacity - even though I don't think I'm good shape right now."

Vouilloz went on to say "I knew I wasn't so fast at the bottom of this course, but I think I lost the world cup at every race this season. After I lost the world championships last season I thought that maybe this wasn't my year. And now I hope to be in good shape for Worlds - I don't know if I can win, but I hope to make a good race."

Asked if he thought age played into his season, the 25-year-old replied, "I wasn't thinking 'oh he's young so he will be faster.' Age isn't a problem, but when you're young you do have new approaches. And to be honest, with Greg - I know he's good but I think I can go faster than him still. But not today."
