113	the mountains, canned with a permanent snowcan, are a lush green during the summer				
	The 4km course proper begins at approximately 840 metres elevation, dropping 600 metres to the venue below which is situated next to a cold mountain river. The track is predominantly cut through grass, and is at times a half meter deep in the hillside.				
133	The top is a fast open section of sweeping turns on doubletrack and gravel road. After a tree section the course follows the peak of a hillside before plunging toward the village				
	below. Two short asphalt sections break up the dirt and grass conditions which are several metres wide at some points.				
	The bottom section is the most challenging as riders fly into a right hairpin and begin a fast and rocky lower speed section. After the second asphalt portion the course drops left, down the fall line with a spectacular off-camber jump. A Swatch speed trap, right-hander and				5 6
