# SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA - xc#2 - 10-11 April 1999 - Report / Rapport - women Sydor at Her Devastating Best

Canada's **Alison Sydor** left nobody in any doubt about her potential to win the Olympic gold medal when the international mountain bike racing circuit returns to Sydney next year.

Today, at the second round of the Diesel-UCI Mountain Bike World Cup, Sydor was unstoppable. With a display of superb fitness, skill and courage on a difficult course, Alison Sydor (CAN) overwhelmed her rivals. She has clearly recovered from the chest infection that hampered her at the first round, at Napa, California two weeks ago.

Perhaps even more impressive was the achievement of *Australian* rider **Mary Grigson**, who rode like an inspired rider and recorded the best performance by an Australian woman in mountain bike competition by finishing second, ahead of *Norway's* **Gunn-Rita Dahle**.

The race, which was held in rapidly changing weather conditions, was relatively short. Heavy rainfall on the evening before the race led to a decision by the Union Cycliste Internationale to complete two 1.8km start loops and then four full 6.9km laps.

Warm sunshine on the day of the race made the course dry, and therefore faster than expected. After the first two start loops there was a short sprint to be the first rider onto the narrow, single track, climb. Sydor got in front of **Alison Dunlap** (USA), winner of the first round of the 1999 World Cup, and remained in the lead for the remainder of the race.

By the end of lap one, Dunlap had slipped back to fourth place, and would finish eighth. *Canada's* **Christina Redden** started lap two in second place, 28 seconds behind Sydor. Redden was accompanied by two other riders, Gunn-Rita Dahle (NOR) and Dunlap. At this point Grigson was seventh, at 53 seconds.

By the end of the second lap, Sydor was 35 seconds clear of her pursuers and Grigson had moved up into fourth place, at 1 minute, 28 seconds.

Sydor maintained her pressure on the field, and was the fastest up the technically demanding Old Gum climb, a one kilometre ascent that riders regarded as the most difficult part of the course. By the start of the final lap she had extended her lead to 57 seconds ahead of Dahle. Grigson had continued her progress and was third, at 1 minute, 20 seconds. On the third lap Grigson was the fastest rider in the race.

The crowd of around 3,000 roared their approval of Grigson, particularly at the rocky Cauldron descent, where she was the fastest and smoothest rider. In the final lap, Grigson continued to be the fastest rider in the race, but her charge was not sufficient to rein in Sydor.

Sydor crossed the line 57 seconds clear of the Australian rider, with Dahle at 1 minute, 20 seconds.

### **Alison Sydor**

"It's fantastic (to win here). It is great to have a good race here like this. I now have 18 months to think about the Olympic Games, and will have good memories from here... After Napa I hadn't expected to get my form back so soon. I had expected it for Europe, but not for here." Sydor, 32, is the reigning world cup champion. She has won the UCI world cup series two times, and has won the world championships three times.

**Mary Grigson** - Asked if the home nation crowd had helped: "Yes, they just about pushed you up the hill with their screams."
