Alison Sydor Returns To Top With Win in Mazatlan

Three-time World Champion and three-time World Cup champion **Alison Sydor** (CAN, Volvo-Cannondale) demonstrated again why she is one of the sport's most enduring and consistent racers when she won round two of the *Tissot-UCI Mountain Bike World Cup* in Mazatlan, Mexico. **Alison Dunlap** (USA, Team GT) finished second for the second week in a row, while **Laurence Leboucher** (FRA, GT) finished third.

Thousands of enthusiastic fans and dry, dusty conditions served as the backdrop for Sunday morning's race, when Sydor made an early attack off the front of her five-lap event and never looked back. With long sections of technical singletrack that kept passing opportunities to a minimum, Sydor said she wanted to be the first rider up the climbs. As it turned out, she was first up the climbs as well as the descents.

Dunlap rode the first lap in 3rd position before moving past **Chrissy Redden** (*CAN*, *Gary Fisher/Saab*) in lap three. Redden rode a strong first half of the race, but faded in the fifth and final lap to finish 4th. While Dunlap chased hard in second position for the second week in a row, she couldn't catch the leader on Mazatlan's twisting course, which are perfect conditions for the veteran Sydor.

Dunlap did hold off the rest of the field, which also included a late surge by 1998 World Champion and teammate Laurence Leboucher (FRA, GT). Leboucher, who says she hasn't had a top-three finish since then, moved up from 5th position in the first four laps before passing Redden in the final lap.

Last week's winner **Mary Grigson** (AUS, Gary Fisher/Saab) finished 5th for the day in a steady effort. Women raced at 10:30 a.m., and the men at 1:30 p.m. - see separate report.

This is the first time the UCI world cup has been held in Latin America, and Sunday's race brought out thousands of fans to the desert-scape racecourse. Women raced five laps of 6.6 kilometres each, plus a 600-metre start loop. Elevation change was approximately 80 metres and track conditions were dusty and loose — with extensive singletrack. Weather was overcast and warm at the venue which is 8km from Mazatlan's center and adjacent to the Pacific Ocean.

With her win in round two, combined with her third place in round one, Alison Sydor takes the lead in the overall world cup standings, just 20 points ahead of second-place Dunlap.

Quoted:

1st Place - Alison Sydor:

"I just wanted to be in the lead on all the climbs and be able to make up times on the descents as well. It's a perfect course for me – it requires a good start, and I've always had a good first lap. Plus it was technical, with all the loose sand and twisting singletrack and I could get an advantage without putting out any extra

energy."

"I knew that with two strong GT riders and two Gary Fisher riders, it could come down to tactics. And my best tactic is to take the lead from the start. But it was totally an individual effort today. It was a hard couple hours, because there was no place to rest. I felt like I was out of the saddle sprinting for an hour and a half of the two hours. On the last lap I rode carefully, to make sure I didn't get any flat tires. I've been racing for a long time, and have a good feeling for what my limits are."

2nd Place - Alison Dunlap:

"I wanted to stay smooth on the descents and not crash, and this is great to get second place. This is a hard course, and I rode so much better than last week – I feel better. I went as hard as I could, but I didn't want to blow, because I knew it would be a long race."

3rd Place – Laurence Leboucher:

"I didn't think I would get third today, because I didn't have a good feeling early. So I'm very happy, because it's two years since I've been top three [since the 1998 World Championships in Mont Sainte-Anne] and I'm coming back to form soon I think. If you told me that I would be top-three today, I would not have believed you!"
